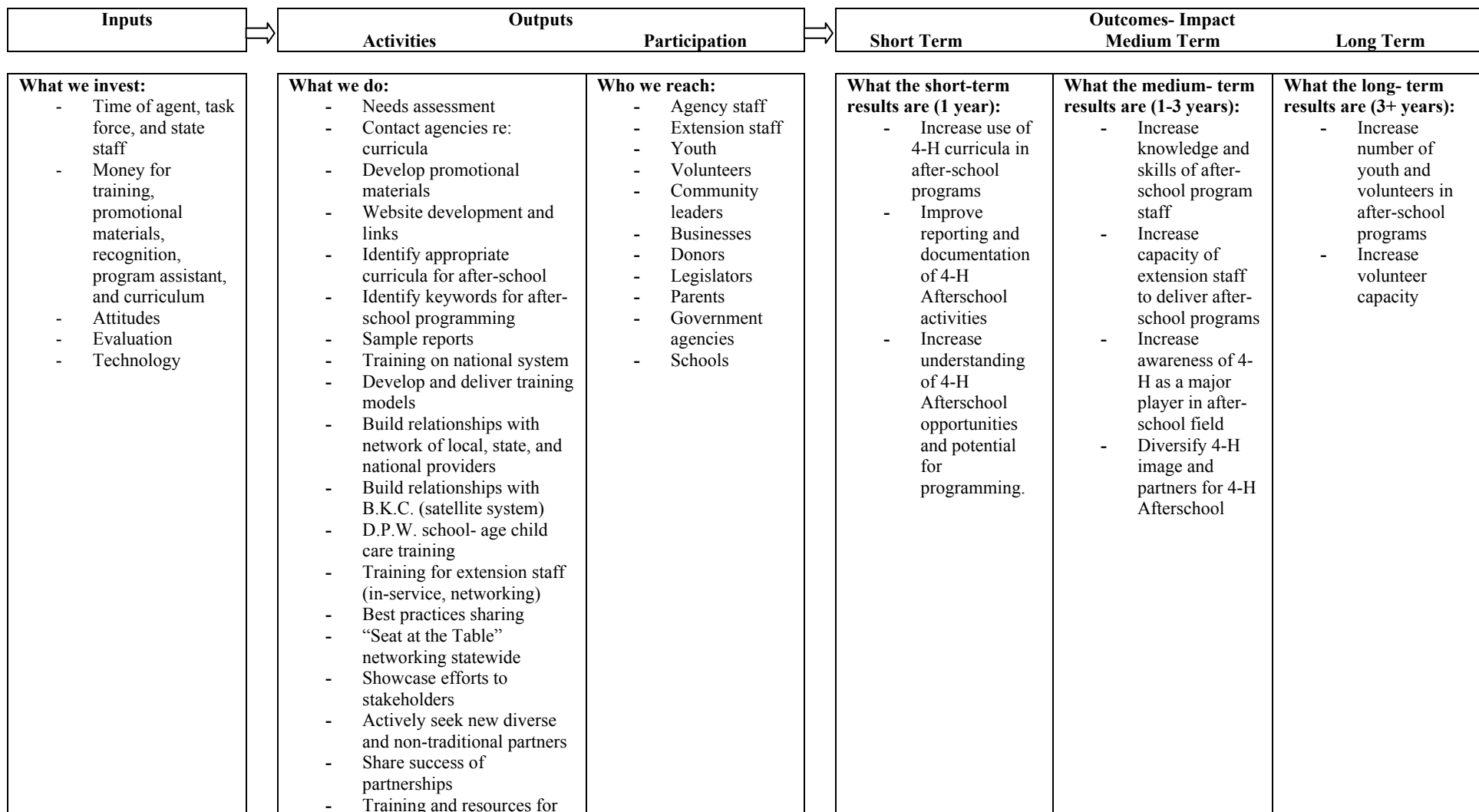


Logic Model of Pennsylvania 4-H Afterschool Programming

Situation: Currently, the 4H Afterschool programming in Pennsylvania is being conducted in collaboration with other agencies and youth-serving organizations¹. Cooperative extension is providing curricula, technical training and support to after-school initiatives as well as starting 4-H clubs in after-school settings. There is a need to centralize support for after-school programming statewide for Extension to play a leadership role at the state and county level. County educators are using federal, state, and local funds to resource after-school efforts. With a national initiative, we need to take advantage of available resources and seek new funding sources to increase 4H Afterschool programming efforts. We need to utilize existing data sources (Extension survey, Better Kid Care, EFNEP, CTC) for needs assessment as well as develop an assessment to be given to extension staff regarding after-school programming needs.

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Assumptions

1. We will conduct programming that impacts the *quality* of existing after-school programs to include:
 - o education and technical assistance
 - o community partnerships
 - o enhancing educational environment
 - o staff development and training for after-school staff
 - o evaluation of after-school programs
 - o providing curriculum support
 - o starting and maintaining 4-H clubs in after-school settings
 - o impacting the quality of the environment of after-school programs
 - o helping children involved in after-school programs to have positive outcomes
2. We will involve 4-H and family and consumer science staff in after-school programming efforts
3. There is administrative support for after-school programming efforts
4. After-school programming will be part of the next plan of work cycle
