KEYNOTE: *Forgotten Garden Combinations - Jessica Walliser* Gardeners often overlook the most important pairing in the garden – the combination of a garden space with the personality of its owner. Not only will you be able to create a garden that reflects you and your family, you'll also learn how to ensure the best and brightest plant combinations for gardens of all types. This lively lecture discusses blending perennials, annuals, shrubs and bulbs to form pleasing displays and teaches you how to translate those combinations to suit your own gardening style.

Session #1: *Raising Monarchs* These amazing insects are a jewel of the garden. Learn about their life and how easy it is to raise them in your yard.

Session #2: *Get the Digs on Dirt* Jessica Walliser This lecture discusses the importance of soil to garden performance. Learn about soil composition and how to use it to your advantage. Easy composting methods are discussed along with other organic soil amendments.

Session #3: *A Day in the Fall, Setting the Stage For the Birds* A photogenic presentation from twilight to dusk of the feeding cycle of fall birds in a suburban setting.

Session #4: *Description of Plants in Murder and Mayhem* Plants have been used for their beneficial properties throughout the centuries, but at times, they've also been used for more nefarious deeds. Learn about a number of plants with poisonous or other undesirable properties, and how you, your children and pets, can avoid falling victim to those effects.

Session #5: *Gardening for EVERY BODY* Ergonomic suggestions, ideas for easier access, tips for everyone which may make gardening easier on your body. This session will give ideas on how to garden with less stress on joints and backs while still enjoying all of the positive effects of gardening.

Session #6: *Native Alternatives to Invasive Garden Plants* What are natives? Learn why natives are important to the landscape and why you should not have invasive plants in your garden.

Session #7: *Insects* Suzanne Wainwright-Evans Do you know what the bug in your garden is? Tips on identification with good photos!

Session #8: *Cast a Leaf* Everyone has a bit of artistic ability and this **EASY** workshop will help you create a beautiful and weatherproof piece of botanical art for your garden. Using a large hosta leaf and a few other materials, this will be the beginning to a whole host of items you can make for yourself or that special gift. **You MUST bring safety glasses and rubber gloves.**

Session #9: *The Healing Garden* The fact that gardens have been used throughout history to aid in the healing process can be traced back to the early Asian, Arabic and Roman cultures. Presently, some institutions are installing extensive gardens and landscapes as an important part of the healing process. This presentation provides an historical perspective, explains the difference between a therapeutic and a healing garden, and provides examples of healing gardens. We will also discuss the important elements of healing gardens and the steps individuals can take to modify an existing garden or to start planning a healing garden.

Session #10: *What's Happening in My Garden* A panel of Master Gardeners who staff the Hort Desk telephones and emails will be here to answer questions regarding home gardens. The hour will also include a discussion of the top ten questions answered in 2012. Bring your questions on perennials, shrubs, trees, vegetables, etc., to learn what's happening in your garden!

Session #11: *Vegetable Gardening from November to January...Really!* The end of the summer growing season doesn't have to be the end of your garden. Cool-season vegetables like lettuce, beets, carrots, broccoli, cabbage and chard just love the combination of warm autumn days and cool nights. With a little planning and preparation, you can extend the growing season a few weeks, or even a few months, and still have a fresh salad for Thanksgiving.
